Dear Superintendent Crocker,

The Board of Supervisors designated the San Luis Obispo County Child Care Planning Council as the local State-mandated planning body in 1991. Pursuant to the language in Assembly Bill 1542, the Board of Supervisors and the County Superintendent of Schools are required to be involved in the local child care planning process by appointing Council members, establishing terms, designating two persons to assist California Department of Education with reviewing and scoring of child care services applications, approving priorities and the county wide needs assessment.

The Council members are jointly appointed by the County Board of Supervisors and the County Superintendent of School. Each entry sends a liaison to the Council meetings and the current liaisons are Brad Schultz for the Superintendent of Schools and Elise Roberts for the Board of Supervisors.

Attached for your approval is the 2013 Local Planning Council County Child Care and Development Needs Assessment. Approval of the Needs Assessment allows the Council to meet State-mandated requirements. The Needs Assessment provides current data on the demand and need for subsidized and unsubsidized child care/learning program needs and assists the Council in educating the community, local and state professionals and decision makers on the needs of the community


